Student Instructions

- Students will log on to the <u>USAonRace.com</u> website and click on the Login link that is at the top
 of every page. Then, copy and paste your assigned username and password into the
 designated fields in order to login to the site. After getting logged in, go to the Dialogues and
 Forums link in the main menu and select National Collegiate Dialogue.
- Read the postings for the "Conversation" and "Issue" of the week, post a comment, and then post a response to one or more comments from other student participants.

In addition to assigned usernames and passwords, **USAonRace.com** will provide professors monthly reports on student participation, which will assist in evaluating the level and quality of participation.
